- 4. Explain the novel's varying points of view of the Vietnam War. Which viewpoint would you have taken, had you been living during the late 1960s? Explain why.
- 5. How does Oppenlander use the literary device of foreshadowing to pull the reader into the story?
- 6. Does Tom's death change Andy? How?
- 7. Define hazing and what it does to the people being hazed and to those who do the hazing.
- 8. Andy feels guilty several times during this novel. What instances cause Andy to feel guilty and is the guilt justified?
- 9. Why are Tom and Andy friends when they're coming from such different backgrounds?
